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Composting

Yard trimmings and residual food together constitute 26 percent of the U.S. municipal solid waste. That's a lot of waste to send to landfills when it could become useful and environmentally beneficial compost instead!

Composting offers the obvious benefits of resource efficiency and creating a useful product from organic waste that would otherwise have been land filled.

If you're not sure what composting is, the best way to explain it is like this; composting is nature's process of recycling decomposed organic materials into a rich soil know as compost. Anything that was once living will decompose. Basically, backyard composting is an acceleration of the same process nature uses. By composting your organic waste you are returning nutrients back into the soil in order for the cycle of life to continue. Finished compost will look like soil-dark brown, crumbly and smells like a forest floor.

There are many good reasons why you should compost, here are just a few of those reasons; yard and food waste make up to 30% of the waste stream. Composting your kitchen and yard trimmings helps to divert that waste from the landfill, waterways and water treatment facilities. Composting significantly reduces pest problems and your use of pesticides. Composting saves you money, you avoid the cost of buying soil conditioners, bagged manure etc. Composting is also a valuable tool in educating children about nature

and the cycle of life. And there are still so many more reasons to compost, to many more to fit into this article.

There are three basic types of composting. Backyard composting - if you have a yard and balance of browns, (such as fallen leaves or straw) and greens (grass clippings and food scraps), you have the all you need to make compost. Worm composting - if you have a tiny yard or live in an apartment or an abundance of food scrap, this type of composting is for you. Grasscycling - if you have grass clippings and don't want to use them in a compost pile you can leave them on the lawn to decompose and add back nutrients into the lawn.

It is in everyone's best interest to remember that we all need to reduce, reuse, and recycle organic materials. Yard trimmings, food waste and wood waste can be made into mulch or compost and used to prevent soil erosion and provide valuable nutrients to plants. By examining current Landscaping, food preparation, and disposal practices, communities, businesses, and

individuals can find creative ways to reduce and better municipal solid waste manage.

When composting you should remember that there a few items you should <u>not</u> put into your compost, they are; Black walnut tree leaves or twigs as well as Coal or charcoal ash the reason for this is they could both release substances that might be harmful to plants.

Yard trimmings can be combined with other organic waste, such as food, animal manure, and bio-solids to produce a variety of products with slightly different chemical and physical characteristics.


Baling Wire and Twine
